Many of Waynes neighbors have subdivided their farms for housing making burning and/or spraying to control unwanted species even more challenging. This is of major concern for many land/natural resource managers close to large urban areas.

PEOPLE ON THE PRAIRIE

A workshop entitled "People on the Prairie: Interaction Along the Rural/Urban Interface" was held on June 4, 2004 in Auburn, KS in conjunction with the joint meeting of the Kansas Section and Missouri Chapter of the Society for Range Management.

Sam Albrecht, EVP of SRM led off the workshop with an update about SRM. Current membership is at 3828. Allen Press at Lawrence, KS will be publishing Rangeland Ecology and Management and Rangelands. Future SRM meetings are in Ft. Worth, Vancouver, and Reno.

Scott Satterthwaite gave an overview of the Watershed Management Section of KDHE. He was able to obtain 18 signatures for the Clean Water Pledge. Other speakers in the Kansas Watersheds section included Will Boyer, Dwayne Rice, Curt Walker, and Doug Norsby. Boyer discussed regional planning initiatives and the challenges of dealing with fragmentation. Rice and Walker discussed NRCS's Grassland Reserve Program. Norsby discussed urban development impacts on water quality.

The ecological impacts of fragmentation on the tallgrass prairie were discussed by Charles Lee, Don Althoff, and Ryan Higbie. Lee discussed wildlife concerns particularly the impacts of habitat fragmentation of grassland birds. Althoff shared information about the LCTA Project on Ft. Riley. He emphasized that fragmentation can occur on a very small scale. At Ft. Riley, Johnsongrass, sericea lespedeza, common honeylocust and American elm increased between 1994-2001. Higbie described changes occurring in Johnson County with the influx of more people each year. Farms are declining and being replaced by new home sites, powerlines, and highways.

After lunch the program emphasized carbon sequestration. Clenton Owensby, Scott Staggenborg, and Mark Nieman made presentations. Owensby talked about the importance of grassland soils in storing carbon. Improved management of native grasslands and CRP are important C sinks. Staggenborg discussed the role of cropland in C sequestration. Conservation buffers, cover crops, conservation tillage, and improved rotations can all play an important role. Nieman discussed CRP. There are over 34 million acres of CRP in the U.S. A large number of these contracts will expire in 2007. Current rules allow haying or grazing of one-third of CRP acreage in any given year.

Minutes - Kansas Section, Society for Range Management

President Dwayne Rice called the summer meeting of the Kansas Section to order at 7:15 p.m. on June 3, 2004 at Auburn, KS. He briefly reviewed the agenda and asked for any additions. The minutes of the September 24 meeting held in Hays were published in the Bluestem Bulletin. Walt Fick reported \$8,665.13 in the bank account.

Sam Albrecht, EVP of SRM, gave a report. SRM would like sections to standardize their dues. They are seeking funding to support special issue papers, career brochures, to help with the Washington D.C. office, and improve the website. Jeff Davidson moved and Garry Harter seconded a motion to provide SRM with \$1,000 to help publish an issue paper on rangeland fire. Albrecht announced that the Journal of Range Management will be renamed "Rangeland Ecology and Management."

The Kansas Range Youth Camp, chaired by Doug Spencer, will be held July 6-9, at the Rock Springs 4-H Camp. A Basic Range Management School will be held August 17-19 at Council Grove. The Advanced Range Management School will be held at Scott Lake, August 25-27.

Kansas Section, SRM Web Site: Fick suggested that Mike Haddock was willing to take over as webmaster for the web site. Carol Blocksome suggested writing up a job description and making the webmaster an appointed Section position. She will have the job description ready by the fall meeting.

Blocksome reported on the special meeting held on March 29. The lack of elections last fall were of concern but it was decided to carry over officers and wait until the next regularly scheduled time to elect new officers and directors. A change in the bylaws was proposed to have incoming officers/directors start their terms on January 1.

Rice reported on interest in watershed rehabilitation. Large amount of concern these days about non-native phreatophyes such as salt cedar. He has had communication with the Kansas Alliance of Wetlands and Streams (KAWS) about the issue. It has been proposed to have a joint meeting of KAWS, the Kansas Grazing Land Coalition (KGLC), and the Kansas Section, SRM to discuss the ecology of riparian areas and wetlands in Kansas. Could possibly have a series of 3-5 meetings across Kansas based on Major Land Resource Areas (MLRA) to address the issue. A grant may be needed to support development of the program for speakers and travel. KAWS would take the lead in

writing the grant and planning the meetings. Brian Obermeyer suggested a need for a biological survey of current land use in Kansas compared to land use around 1860 and aerial photos from the 1930s. Dale Kirkham emphasized the need to include management of the upper ends of watersheds. Hopefully we would have some input into speakers, etc. Jeff Davidson moved and Carol Blocksome seconded a motion that the Kansas Section, SRM be involved with KAWS and KGLC in developing riparian/stream zones meetings.

A brochure is still being worked on by Karen Hickman according to Keith Harmoney. They are looking for good photos of SRM activities, research, rangeland resources, etc.

<u>Fall Meeting:</u> There is a good possibility that the Kansas Section could meet jointly with the Kansas and Oklahoma Chapters of the Wildlife Society this fall. They are planning a meeting emphasizing habitat loss and wind generation. President Rice will pursue this possibility.

The meeting adjourned at 8:30 p.m. with a presentation of the Trail Boss Award to Walter Fick.
