Rain! It's raining again today, tapping on the tin roof as I'm tapping on the computer. This rain comes about 10 days after the big Labor Day drought buster, that was certainly welcome but not without consequences, considering the fatality on the KS Turnpike. That flash flood event serves as a reminder of how vulnerable we are to the forces of mother nature.

Drought has been a problem for several years, especially the western part of the state, and throughout the states west of here. Drought brings challenging times for rangeland managers, but drought is also a characteristic of rangelands. On a tour at the Konza Prairie the other day, I learned that weather extremes can be expected over the next several years – longer dry spells, followed by large rain events. ### MINUTES KANSAS SECTION, SRM MEETING

President Jeff Davidson opened the meeting at 7:00 p.m. on June 24, 2003 at Wah'Kon-Tah Prairie, El Dorado Springs, MO. Minutes were approved as published in the Bluestem Bulletin. Walt Fick gave treasurer's report for Joe Hecht. Fick reported that the section has about \$6,700 plus an additional \$1,000 from the Southern Section for helping host the annual SRM meeting in Kansas City. Fick reported that 434 newsletters were distributed in April.

I&E report: A brochure to help recruit and inform the public about rangelands in Kansas was discussed. The I&E committee was asked to come up with an idea for a brochure, identify the market, get estimated printing costs, suggested distribution, and report at fall meeting. The location of the current poster display was discussed.

Fall meeting: Dwayne Rice will make arrangements. The meeting will most likely be in the Ellsworth area in September.

Range Youth Camp: Davidson reported that Doug Spencer had 29 registered for the July 8-11 camp.

### KANSAS RANGE YOUTH CAMP

The 42nd Annual Kansas Range Youth Camp was held at the Rock Springs 4-H Center on July 8-11, 2003. Doug Spencer chaired the camp. Other instructors and counselors included Barry Barber, Tim Miller, Toni Wesley, David Kraft, Dwayne Rice, Chris Tecklenburg, Amanda Shaw, Lorne Denetclaw, Walt Fick, Steve Kolarick, and Mike Christian. Twenty-nine vouth from around Kansas learned about range management through a combination of indoor and field activities. Topics covered included: an overview of rangelands in Kansas, plant identification and plant growth, soils/range sites, range condition, stocking rates, animal nutrition, grazing distribution, plant/animal interactions, wildlife and rangelands, grazing management tools, riparian area management/water quality, and careers in range management. Camp participants visited the Alan Hubbard operation near Olsburg, KS to learn about water developments and fencing associated with management intensive grazing. Participants also walked around the Burn's pasture adjacent to the camp to compile information needed to present a management plan. Top plant ID and range management exam winners were: Nathan Knobloch, Madison, Jacob Greene, Jewell, Tanner Popp, Hoxie, Austin Williams, Agra, and Avery Land, Burlingame.
